All members are to appear in full kit w/o arms. The wearing of KRR approved medals is encouraged.


The cost for members is \$12.00 either cash or cheque. Pls do not expect to charge this function to your account. Persons under 12 at \$8.00.


The meal will be buffet with a sit-down arrangement at tables. Many members wish to return to the more formal Regimental Dinner format.

7. STRIPPING YOUR LOCK or A SUBLIMATED DEATHWISH

We seem to be getting a lot of broken lock parts, many of which relate to strange maintenance procedures rather than simple wear.

Those of you more familiar with Military practices will recognize that small arms have two definite maintenance levels - i. that level of stripping which the soldier himself performs to service his weapon, and ii. that level of stripping which is reserved for armourers only as the average soldier either doesn't have the tools or the specialized knowledge of how to proceed.

The Lock of your musket falls into this latter category. Very, very few of us possess the tools or the understanding of the correct sequence of the working parts to successfully strip the lockwork without running an excessive risk of damaging its proper functioning.

To make things more binding - other than satisfying idle curiousity, there is no need to strip the Lock in order to maintain it for efficient & safe operation.

Taking the Lock off the musket and thoroughly washing/scrubbing it in hot, soapy water, using a toothbrush or stiff bristled paint brush to get into the nooks and crannies, and then spraying or painting it entirely with WD-40 or similar light, lubricating oil will do the trick and runs no risks.

Of course, rinse copiously after cleaning and before oiling. The main areas of concern from a safety hazard point of view are the two notches in the tumbler which engage the sear. These are the half-cock notch and the full-cock notch. If the notches become clogged with dirt, the musket is in danger of either 'going off half cocked' or having too light a trigger pull to be considered safe when full-cocked. This latter is extremely dangerous when you are at the 'Recover' awaiting the command to Fire.

So, a regular inspection of these two notches, without disassembling the Lock, is very much in order and if you cannot clean them out with the stiff brush or dissolve the dirt with the soapy water, then clean them with the point of a pin.

So, save yourself money and aggravation and a long wait for new parts. Don't strip your Lock!

9. HILDA SZABO RETIRES



12. TOUGH MONKEYS - AN ORIGINAL ACCOUNT OF LIFE IN MONTREAL From WO 28/5 p.56.

"On the night of the 20 August 1781 between the hours of 10 and 11 0' Clock at night Mr. Prentice (at the time an Ensign; but, appointed as the second Lieutenant of Grenadiers in November 1781. Prentice was in the English Militia at the Defence of Quebec in 1775) and myself was going home from Capt. Jos Anderson's Quarters, having received orders to send out a Party next morning I called upon Serjeant Gordon who was Quartered at Lapopts house, to order him for this Command knocked at the door finding no answer from within, we walked away but not many steps when Lepopt oppened his door and fired a musket which Wounded me in the Side - in the mean time Mr Prentice Run to

the door which he found bolted forced it and give LePopt a stroke with his open hand and sent him to the Guard, but upon finding my hurt was not dangerous the man was set at Liberty - Jno Valentine

Adjt KRR NY

Montreal 7 Jan'y 1782"

Certainly an interesting tale: Why Valentine was writing a formal report of this affair 6 months after its occurence is a good question. Also, why was IaPopt set loose after committing a crime similar to attempted murder.

For the first question, I believe that Prentice was under investigation for other situations where he used force to make his point. To the second question, one suspects that there is much more to this story than meets the eye, and also, there were repeated disputes between the Canadiens and there there imposed guests and every effort was made to smooth things over if possible.

Next time we're in Chambly we can recreate this scene. Dan Moreau can get shot and Reg can beat down the door and deliver a 'stroke of his hand'.
